Harassment During the COVID-19 Pandemic

With the COVID-19 pandemic, persons who are infected with the virus, their families, and healthcare workers face unfair treatment including discrimination, prejudice, and abuse, in what could be called a “witch-hunt.”

- For example,
- Being treated as a virus carrier just because a family member is a healthcare worker.
 - Being told “we cannot work with a suspected carrier,” even after having tested negative by PCR testing.



Anyone can become infected with COVID-19. Instead of blaming and excluding those who are infected or have symptoms, we should be considerate and give them a warm welcome when they return.

It’s also important to address the disease and the changes it has brought about within society in an appropriate manner, namely, on the basis of scientific knowledge and views, instead of having unfounded fear.

Let’s enforce appropriate infection control, such as avoiding the three Cs, washing our hands and gargling, and pray for an early end to COVID-19, all the while remembering to protect the dignity of ourselves and others.
